
Child Care Barriers for Black Pregnant and Parenting Families in St. Louis

Logistical Barriers



In a perfect world, child care would be in the neighborhood with plenty of staff and educational and nutritional resources.



of St. Louis families are unable to secure a child care slot, representing over **20,870** children.



of providers offer nonstandard hours of care, accounting for only <u>8 open</u> <u>slots per 100</u> children who need that care.

Economic Barriers

The financial burden of paying for child care is highest on Black families.



The expense of child care puts families in a position of having to make choices about housing, food, transportation, savings, and more.

Median monthly child care cost per child in St. Louis. The average financial burden on these families is **28%** of household income and may be even higher in some cases.
