Program Description

This FLOURISH grant funded the Londyn Project at Keep It Real Youth Outreach. The purpose of this project was to provide support services to young, African Americans, ages 14-25 years of age, who are pregnant, parenting and/or homeless. This project took place from August 2020 to July 2021.

The support services provided included resources, referrals, transportation to medical appointments, and had curriculum developed by a nurse practitioner. All programs of Keep It Real Youth Outreach are a continuum of care and provide a way for these young women to be in control of their own lives and destinies.

Priority Areas

FLOURISH Community Leaders Cabinet identified priority areas they believe will have the most significant impact on improving conditions for Black families. Infant mortality is a complex issue that can't be solved by one organization alone. Below, you will find population level data where FLOURISH is contributing to changes for Black families alongside other organizations. FLOURISH uses **a results-based accountability** model of evaluation, because it helps show how collaborative efforts can make an impact on reducing disparities in infant mortality. 
