Program Description

This FLOURISH grant funded the Show Me Strong Families program at Parents As Teachers. The purpose of the grant is to develop and implement policies and procedures for embedding the services of doulas into the evidence-based parenting education and family well-being support services we provide primarily to African-American pregnant and parenting participants in St. Louis City and part of North St. Louis County through Show Me Strong Families (SMSF) Parents as Teachers (PAT). This project took place from March 2021 to June 2022.

Priority Areas

FLOURISH Community Leaders Cabinet identified priority areas they believe will have the most significant impact on improving conditions for Black families. Infant mortality is a complex issue that can't be solved by one organization alone. Below, you will find population level data where FLOURISH is contributing to changes for Black families alongside other organizations. Parents As Teachers National Center is working to move the needle for the individuals they serve in the areas listed below.

FLOURISH uses a results-based accountability model of evaluation, because it helps show how collaborative efforts can make an impact on reducing disparities in infant mortality. We focus on how well programs address root causes of the issue and whether Black pregnant and parenting families are better off.

Integrating Support Staff

The two new certified lactation consultants and the Parent Educators who completed the perinatal mood disorder certification was a first in our agency history.

To **institutionalize doula supports**, we documented all process and materials including implementation guidelines, policies, procedures, tools/records to measure impact and client facing materials.

Also, firsthand doula experiences were shared by a Parent Educator doula in the Community Impact Network video testimony.

Project Highlights

We learned that doula services are an excellent compliment to the Parents as Teachers model at the Show Me Strong Families affiliate level as well as the replication level for affiliates across the United States. There is a need for this service and an interest among families the Show Me Strong Families program serves.

Positive Birth Experiences

100% of pregnant participants enrolled in the program reported having a positive birth experience

94% of birthing participants delivered without health complications

100% of pregnant participants reported reduced stress

100% of pregnant participants increased feelings of support during the perinatal period
